ADF GAP Year 2024

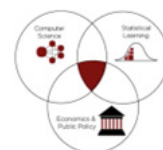
ADF GAP YEAR

The Good Careers Guide website states that Policy Analysts develop and advise on policies that guide government and commercial departments and organisations.



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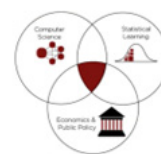

Career as an Intelligence & Policy Analyst



Some of the day-to-day tasks of include –

- organising, collecting, collating and analysing data, and developing intelligence information, such as electronic surveillance
- compiling and distributing intelligence information using briefings, maps, charts, reports and other methods
- liaising and consulting with program administrators and other interested parties to identify policy needs
- reviewing existing policies and legislation to identify anomalies and out-of-date provisions

To become an Intelligence and Policy Analyst, a student usually needs a bachelor degree in intelligence operations, political science, international relations, or another related field to work as an Intelligence or Policy Analyst. It is also quite common to complete postgraduate studies.

University Clinical Aptitude Test

The **University Clinical Aptitude Test (UCAT)** is an admissions test used by the UCAT ANZ Consortium of universities in Australia and New Zealand for their **medical, dental, and clinical science degree programs**. Universities requiring the UCAT are listed at this link - [Universities requiring the UCAT](#). Students intending to apply for courses requiring the UCAT at any of these universities are reminded that they will need to **book a test**.

Bookings will open on 1 March 2023 and close 17 May 2023. The testing dates will be from 3 July 2023 to 12 August 2023.

Human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine information for parents/carers

From 6 February 2023, the National Immunisation Program (NIP) dosing schedule for the human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine has changed from two doses to a single dose for most people.

The information below explains the change so you are aware of how it affects your child.

How has the HPV vaccine schedule changed?

From 6 February 2023, the recommended HPV vaccine schedule for most people has changed from two-doses to a single dose course using the same Gardasil®9 vaccine. There is no change to the amount of vaccine that is given in the single dose.

Why was this change made?

The change is based on advice from the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI), who have considered and reviewed the latest international clinical evidence. ATAGI support the large volume of clinical findings that a single dose of HPV vaccine provides about the same protection as two doses of HPV vaccine.

What about for people who are immunocompromised?

The schedule has not changed for immunocompromised people, and they should receive three doses of HPV vaccine which are all funded under the NIP. If you are not sure if your child is immunocompromised, we recommend you discuss this with your child's GP.

What is the HPV vaccine?

The Gardasil®9 vaccine protects against HPV infection, which is a common viral infection, usually affecting the genitals and spread through sexual contact. The vaccine is most effective when given before exposure to the virus, that is before a person becomes sexually active. More information about HPV and the HPV vaccine can be found [here](#).

What are the benefits of receiving the HPV vaccine?

The HPV vaccine Gardasil®9 protects against seven HPV types which cause over 90 per cent of cervical cancer in people with a cervix and over 90 per cent of HPV-related cancers in people without a cervix. It also protects against an additional two HPV types which cause 90 per cent of genital warts.

People who are vaccinated for HPV are best protected from being infected with a cancer-causing virus.

What do you need to do?

Your council immunisation service will seek your consent for vaccinations delivered at school as usual.

If you have already given consent for your child's HPV vaccination, and agree to your child having a single dose of Gardasil®9 vaccine instead of the previous two doses, you do not need to take any further action.

Victorian Police

Our local Police Youth Liaison Officers will be delivering an Interactive program based around harm minimisation which will include discussions around safe choices & decision making in relation to the law.

City of Greater Dandenong (Youth Services)

City of Greater Dandenong Youth Services Team will be delivering a health session on Smoking & Illicit Drugs.

This workshop is designed to increase young people's understanding of:

- cigarettes, shisha and e-cigarettes
- the negative impacts of smoking/vaping
- the dangers of illicit drug use, focusing on cannabis and inhalants
- debunk common myths and assumptions about substance use and the law

Mental Health Practitioner

Our school's Mental Health Practitioner Xin will be discussing healthy ways to deal with stress and the importance of self-care.

Adolescent Health Nurse

Our Adolescent Health Nurse will be discussing Respectful Relationships, consent, and sexual health.

Pat Cronin Foundation

The Pat Cronin Foundation was established by Matt and Robyn Cronin in memory of their 19-year-old son who died from a coward punch on a night out in Diamond Creek in 2016. The Pat Cronin Foundation and the *Be Wise Education* program were established to help end the coward punch by helping young people to make wise decisions.

The program provides students with resources and presentations to raise awareness about the drivers and consequences of social violence and how their actions could impact on other people.

Information – The P.A.R.T.Y. On Program

Do you have a young person in your life aged between 18 and 24?

Would they benefit from more knowledge of the potential consequences of taking risks?

Do they have the perception that *"it won't happen to me"*?

The Alfred's P.A.R.T.Y. (Prevent Alcohol and Risk- Related Trauma in Youth) program are presenting an event on **Thursday the 30th of March, 2023** so that older youth and their families and friends can be better informed about the consequences risk-taking.

The **2.5 hour program** will run from **5pm to 7.30pm** with a combination of video, demonstrations and live presentations with Alfred Health clinicians and a past Alfred trauma patient. The program covers information from pre-hospital to rehabilitation focusing on the care a trauma patient may go through. It provides real information about traumatic injury through the lived experience of others.

The event will be held at **The Betty & John Laidlaw AO Alfred Innovation & Education Hub**, located at the **Alfred precinct at 75 Commercial Road, Melbourne**.

Tickets costs are:

- \$30.00 per person
- \$25.00 per ticket for student/concession or for 3 or more tickets

Light refreshments will be provided.

The event will be run in accordance to COVID-19 safety precautions and will be rescheduled should there be a changed response to COVID risk.

Secondary School Immunisation Program

Dear parent/guardian,

The Secondary School Immunisation Program offers free vaccines to all eligible Year 7 and Year 10 students.

Year 7 students

- Diphtheria-tetanus-whooping cough (pertussis) - single injection
- Human papillomavirus (HPV) – two injections, spaced a minimum of six months apart

Year 10 students

- Meningococcal ACWY – single injection

The local council immunisation service delivers the school-based immunisation program. The local council will provide immunisation consent forms to your child's school for your child to bring home. Parents/guardians are required to complete and return the immunisation consent forms to their child's school.

The [Public Health and Wellbeing Regulations, 2019](#), authorises secondary schools to provide their local council with student and parent/guardian contact information for any student scheduled to receive a vaccination. This information is only used to assist local councils to follow-up parents/guardians of students with incomplete or missing immunisation consent forms.

What information is given to local council?

The school provides the following basic student and parent/guardian contact information to the local council immunisation service:

- student name
- date of birth
- gender
- year level and class group
- parent/guardian contact details
- language(s) spoken at home.

Why does the school provide this information?

- To improve communication with parents/guardians regarding their child's vaccination needs.
- To ensure all eligible students are offered the opportunity to access free vaccinations at school.
- To reduce the administrative burden on school staff to follow-up consent forms.
- To eliminate manual data entry processes.

What do I need to do?

1. Read the information provided in your child's consent form and complete all sections.
2. Return the immunisation consent form with all relevant fields completed to school, even if you choose not to consent for your child to be vaccinated as part of the secondary school immunisation program.
3. Your information will be provided to City of Greater Dandenong in March. If you do not wish for your details to be provided, please advise the school in writing before the last school day in February.

Every day vaccination saves lives and makes it possible for Victorians to live free from the illness and disability caused by many infectious diseases.
